Guardians, please arrive at **11:00 am** for the skit, picnic and old fashioned games with your scholar/s. Guardians are responsible for their own 1889 lunch if they so choose to bring one.

Picnic Lunch Ideas: (for Thursday only)

The lunch that the children bring to the schoolhouse should be authentic. Please discuss this with your children.

Ideas for discussion:

Brainstorm a list of possible foods in their lunch pail in 1889.

What fruit would they have? What food would they not have?

What did they wrap the food in?

What did they drink?

Student's lunches contained whatever was in their house. There were no neighborhood grocery stores or school cafeterias. Some children took molasses or lard and sugar sandwiches or cold pancakes leftover from breakfast.

Suggestions:

- Sandwich ex. cheese, jelly, egg or meat
- Bread would have been a biscuit or homemade loaf bread. Mayonnaise was homemade and mustard was not available.
- Hard-boiled eggs
- Fresh Fruit and Vegetables ex. apples, pears, peaches, grapes, plums, carrots, cabbage wedges, tomatoes
- Cookies from scratch (no Oreos, etc.)
- Left-over fried chicken

There were no baggies in 1889. Sandwiches were wrapped in brown paper or butcher paper and food usually dried out. Aluminum foil was not available.

We will be drinking water only, brought in from the □well□ so have each student bring a tin cup for water. You can use a washed out soup can or one bought from a camping supply store.

1889 Attire Ideas:

Most families were every poor in 1889. Please discuss with your children what they would have worn back in those days.

Girls:

- Prairie or sun dress
- Bonnet
- Button up blouse with long skirt
- Apron

Boys:

- Blue jeans
- Button up shirt or flannel shirt
- Overalls
